Stan Paher Favorite Ghost Town <u>ONLINE</u> Thursday November 5, 2020 10:00 am

Self-described desert rat and Nevada native Stan Paher wrote"Nevada Ghost Towns & Mining Camps" in 1970, after doing years of research

with over a thousand fellow Nevadans. Many printings and versions later, the book details the histories of 668 ghost towns along with travel directions. Full of maps and previously unpublished photos of the towns, the people and early Nevada life, the book won the national "Award of Merit" for its history. Stan has authored books and atlases about the west and since 1984 has been a book publisher, specializing in western books. Out of all of the ghost towns he has visited, one is Stan Paher's favorite—we'll learn which one when he presents this program, Favorite Ghost



Stan Paher has written over twenty books and numerous magazine articles about "mining camps and ghost towns" in the west, full of maps and photographs to entice the reader. His publishing house, Nevada Publications, has published over 100 books about the west. Stan is an energetic collector of rare books, maps, photographs, and memorabilia. From an early age, Stan has been drawn to mining camps and their histories, benefitting all of us with the knowledge gleaned.

Music Box

Gears

Around 1880, music boxes progressed from working with cylinders to metal disks. The size and shapes changed but were still relatively expensive for the general public until the 1890s.

For the amusement of the general public, large coin-operated machines were developed and put in public places. The machines were built to be very sturdy and many still survive in museums and private collections.

This beautiful nickel-operated music box was purchased by the Mayer family to be installed and used at their Depot Hotel. The music box was shipped around the horn in 1895.

Charles E. Mayer and his family move to Fort Halleck, Elko County, in the early 1873 from Illinois. He was the post trader at Fort Halleck for fifteen years and then settled in Elko and took up the hotel business where he operated the Depot Hotel and Mayer Hotel. The Depot Hotel was a first-class house for the traveling public that visited Elko.

The Depot Hotel history started out as the Cosmopolitan Hotel that was built near the railroad tracks in 1869. In 1873, the hotel became the Chamberlain and eventually was renamed the Depot Hotel. The Myer family ran this business until they built a new hotel called the Mayer Hotel in 1904.

This music box is currently located in the NHS museum in the center area near the flour sack.

# Nevada Historical Society

The Nevada Historical Society is Located at 1650 North Virginia Street in Reno, Nevada. The cost to visit the museum is Adults \$5/pp, free for Members and Children 17 & under.

Once again due to the Covid-19 museum hours are restricted and no docent tours are currently available. You may self tour with limited occupancy.

The museum is open to the public from 10:00 am -4:00 pm on Wednesdays; access to the museum on Thursday and Friday is by appointment.

The Research Library is open by appointment only Wednesday—Friday from noon—4:00 pm.

Docents are welcome Wednesday—Friday from 10:00 am -4:00 pm, but due to the need to limit occupancy and to have workstations available, please let Shery or Catherine know in advance when you plan to come.

You may self tour with limited occupancy.

After all the computers have been upgraded, the plan is to have scheduling software in place that docents can use to reserve workstations for specific times.
